

Dear Parents and Carers,

We hope you and your children have had a good first two weeks of the Autumn 2 term. It has been action-packed in school as always with lots of updates below for you to enjoy.

Belleville has always had a strong focus on continual improvement and it's a good time at the end of the first half term to reflect on how we have already progressed with our specific foci for the year and where we are going to next.

Your child may have told you that they have had visitors to their classrooms this term. We have been able to once again invite trusted colleagues who have/do run excellent schools themselves, and in some cases are serving Ofsted inspectors, along with your local governors and the curriculum directors from the trust to see the school and share their insights into what we are doing well and how we could improve further.

## Focus I: Quality First Education

One of Belleville's strengths, over many years, has been a continual focus on the pursuit of excellence in all areas of the school and for all of the children we serve. We work hard to support our classroom teachers in what to teach, how to teach it well and that this is of a consistently good quality across classes, year groups, subjects and sites.

We want all of our children to feel and to know that they are successful readers, writers, mathematicians, scientists, historians, geographers, swimmers, philosophers, designers, gymnasts, artists, dancers, musicians, linguists and able to play and enjoy a range of sports and physical activity. We employ a wide range of specialist teachers and coaches to offer aspirational provision in areas that can be difficult to teach well by one classroom teacher, as it is in most primary schools. This is alongside equipping children as excellent learners for life and developing the schools' CARE values of considerate, articulate, responsible people who know that effort is the key to success.

### In 2021/22 we are specifically working on:

### <u>Curriculum development</u>

The work to develop a great curriculum is never finished! In 2019/20 we undertook, working with our colleagues in the Trust schools, a full review and re-design of most areas of the curriculum. For parents who have been with the school for a while, you may well have noticed new topics, books and themes that you have not seen before as we developed our focus on how the curriculum develops children as learners, engages them, and is ambitious, relevant and nurturing.

This year, Early Years are working with a new statutory framework which has a welcome emphasis on deep understanding and building children's speaking and listening skills. In subjects from Years I - 6, we are continuing to review, refine and adapt the curriculum design and content to make it as effective and enjoyable for your children as possible.

#### Teaching

Even with the best-laid plans and great resources, teaching 30 children effectively every day is both a science and an art (and sometimes with a little bit of magic woven in). We have always invested heavily in supporting every person who teaches your children to be offering a consistently good provision - especially given the disruption to 'normal' teaching and learning of the last two years due to Covid - this continues to be a high priority.

#### • Meeting the needs of all

We are proud to welcome every child to the Bellville community to benefit from what we are able to offer. We are a diverse community school and our children will have different strengths and needs and at different times. This year we are working to be even more precise and effective in our support both in class and in additional provision for children with their learning and/or social emotional needs. We did find that in general children, given two years of Covid disruption, were finding it harder to focus, be resilient and to manage friendships 'in real life' than previously. We have already found that the use of 'Zones of Regulation' is helping children to manage their feelings and choices better and are pleased to be working with more experts from play therapists, Educational Psychologist, drama therapist and our new NHS wellbeing practitioner.



### Focus 2: Professional Development

As we always say on INSET days, the quality of the school cannot be greater than the quality of its staff. A key part of our recruitment is to find those people that share the school's ethos – we look for staff are eager and willing to learn more and develop their practice to support your children and our community even better.

We have been so impressed by the way all of the staff learned (at speed and often short notice as Covid struck) new techniques and ways to teach, support, encourage and play with your children during the restrictions in school and during lockdowns. As we continue into this year, we are focussing on building and refining the skills and knowledge of all staff further through access to training, courses, peer support, mentoring and coaching.

## Focus 3: Communication and Engagement

Communication and engagement is our final core focus for the year – that includes with children, parents and carers, staff, governors, the trust and the wider community.

We are using some of the ways we learned through lockdowns – for example, the recent series of workshops to welcome the classes, reading, zones of regulation and maths over Zoom for parents and carers have been well attended with positive feedback. We have also been working closely with the local governors to make the school website a more useful tool for its users and to make sure it reflects what is happening across your school.

We are excited by the possibilities now that more in-person meetings and events can happen for your children with clubs, trips and visitors (all done in a Covid-secure way) as well as PTA events and activities. We hope to announce some small projects that parents and carers can get involved in soon to help improve the school grounds (no technical skills and only a couple of hours of time required).

We have been holding small tour of prospective parents and carers in person over the last few weeks – more dates are now available so do tell your friends!

# Covid Reminders - Help us to Keep Everyone Safe

We have had 10 cases during half term and 14 confirmed cases in the two weeks since the holiday affecting children and staff on both sites – although this is a small number given the size of the school, it is the highest rate we have seen since Covid started. Public Health England sent us a letter which we sent to you on Monday and we will continue to keep them updated and pass on any further advice or actions needed to you.

## Please can you continue to:

- Keep your child at home if they are unwell and get a **PCR test** if they may be showing symptoms, however mild (lateral flow home tests are not a sensitive enough to pick up infections early)
- Wear a mask when on the school sites, including the playgrounds (unless exempt)
- Children above II and adults test regularly at home using lateral flow tests

We are recognising this by celebrating Odd Socks Days on Monday 15th November.

To celebrate children can wear odd socks (socks that don't match) if they would like to.

When: Morning drop off, Wednesday 17th and Thursday 18th November


Where: All playgrounds at Webbs and Meteor site


