Spotlight on Northcote Library

At a time when so many libraries are closing down, we are fortunate that a brand new library has opened recently a stone's throw away from Webb's Road.

We asked Lauren, a children's librarian at Northcote Library, to tell us more about the library, to give us some book recommendations and explain why she thinks reading is so important.

"The library holds hundreds of children's books, from board and picture books, to beginning to read, through to chapter books, non-fiction and teen fiction. Becoming a member of the library is incredibly easy - you can sign up here and then pop along to see us to collect your library card. Library members can borrow 50 books at any one time, and can borrow them for up to three weeks.

From Saturday 8th July, children are invited to sign up to the Summer Reading Challenge! This year's theme is 'Ready, Set, Read!' and we will have a number of sport-themed activities throughout Wandsworth Libraries over the course of the summer. For more information, please see here.


The Thames and Tide Club - Katya Balen

see the Thames in a different light. A fun read with lots of humour and fishy puns!








This book has been written in partnership with the EmpathyLab, an organisation which aims to build children's empathy, literacy and social activism through high-quality
